Whereas the world is facing enormous crises that threaten peace and stability between peoples and between nations--interreligious strife, climate change, depletion of the world's natural resources, food insecurity, vast numbers of people unprepared for meaningful employment in the industries of the twenty-first century, and the immense economic divides between the wealthiest few and the vast majority of the world's citizens; and,

Whereas well-meaning and caring people can be found in all groupings of society; and,

Whereas science and technology, when properly applied, can assist humans in being good stewards of God's gifts and in determining the future of our planet; and,

Whereas a powerful and benevolent voice is necessary to overcome the resistance to joining disparate groups together; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Metropolitan Washington, D. C. Synod Assembly requests that His Holiness, Pope Francis, as the leader of the world's largest religious organization, call an ecumenical council to bring together leaders of all major world religions, skeptics, agnostics and atheists in a concerted effort to deal with the enormous crises the world now faces; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Metropolitan Washington, D. C. Synod Assembly directs the bishop of the synod to communicate this request directly to Pope Francis in writing, as in the attached letter.

43 We are writing to implore you, as the leader of the world's largest religious organization, to call

46 now faces: religious strife, global warming, depletion of the world's natural resources, food
47 insecurity, vast numbers of people destitute because they are unprepared for meaningful
48 employment in the industries of the 21st century, and the huge and growing economic divides
49 between the wealthiest in every nation and the vast majority of the world's citizens. These are
50 just some of the challenges that combine to create a questionable future for our planet.

52 together to design and implement measures that will reduce the dangers we face? Science and
53 technology, when properly applied, can allow us to become stewards of God's gifts in
54 determining the future of our planet. We need a voice powerful and benevolent enough to bring
55 us together. Please call for an ecumenical council to tackle these issues before it is too late.
