Report of the Stewardship and Mission Table

There was a time in my life that I didn't like to talk about money. A long time.

It became especially awkward for me when I became a pastor, and talking about money in relation to giving seemed to be rather self-serving. My salary, after all, comes out of those offerings people give.

But here's a couple of things I've learned that have changed things around for me:

First of all, I've learned people need to give. It's a spiritual practice. It's a sign of commitment. It connects us with others in a shared mission. And if that's not convincing enough, giving is good for our physical and mental health. (I'd guess that to be true both for individuals and congregations!)

If we're concerned about others' spiritual, emotional, and physical health, talking about money and encouraging people and congregations to give simply makes sense.

The second reason that I'm (nearly) no longer embarrassed to ask people to give money, is that I'm excited about what we do with that money!

Our synod is starting new ministries. We're an Acts 2 church, reaching out to new communities and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. When I'm at my Potomac conference meetings with Rev. Anteneh Gebreselassie, I hear about the joys and challenges of starting a new Amharic speaking ministry and know my congregation helped make it happen.

When the synod council approved the formation of an anti-racism team, members of my congregation were then able to be part of synod-wide conversations about racism. We have learned from each other and received resources which we use in our own congregation. This sharing is made possible because we're part of a synod.

We don't have a large youth group at Good Shepherd in Alexandria, and sometimes youth events are disappointing if only 2 or 3 attend. I am grateful that youth from our congregation can take part in synod-supported youth events such as Shema or Shekinah or Chrysalis. There I am assured that they will meet with other Lutheran youth, developing relationships and having faith-filled conversations which are important for their spiritual formation. (Our youth say that they are grateful that they have a good time!)

At the Stewardship and Mission table we talk about money. A lot.

This past year we've written letters to congregations thanking you for your financial gifts and sharing some of the stories of mission in and around our synod. We've hosted stewardship workshops to share best practices and help congregations develop their own stewardship plans. Most recently, we asked Bishop Graham to help with a YouTube "thank you" video that congregations might share with their councils, at annual meetings, on their website or Facebook pages. (The link is here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=OuxiMJOaCjc Share it widely!)

Those around the table this year have included synod staff members Rev. Phil Hirsch, Rev. Shannon Anderson, Rev. Tom Knoll, and Maddie Tallman as well as Carolyn Sowinski, Alice Benson, Rev. Greg Durig, Bob Sargeant, Marlynn Bauch, Laura Newbury, and myself.

We want to help you and your congregation get excited about talking about money because your financial gifts translate into ministry.

Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Maryland, College Park (LCM @ UMD)

Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Maryland continues to build disciples and leaders in the church. Check out our webpage for photos, videos, and more information about campus ministry at the University of Maryland. www.LutheranTerps.com

In the 2015-2016 school year we are engaging in faith formation, leadership development, and discipleship building through these weekly programs:

- Dinner and casual, student-led worship every Sunday night during the semester
- 4 student led small groups (called "huddles") centered around discipleship building in everyday lives
- Sharing lemonade on campus with students, providing an opportunity for relationship building
- Bible study for graduate students
- En Camino, our tutoring program for at-risk Latino children
- CARing Kids, our mentoring program pairing at-risk elementary school children with university student mentors
- Joyful Noise, our student led praise band

In addition, we have several special events throughout the year:

- Bi-annual student retreats focusing on service, learning, and worship
- A yearly alternate spring break trip with the Towson and UMBC LCM's focused on learning about a specific issue of concern in the world; this past year, 14 people went to South Carolina to learn about race and poverty
- A yearly road trip at the end of the school year; last year, we went to southwestern Virginia and learned about the lives of people in rural Appalachia as well as the environmental issues they are facing. This year (2016) we will go to Haiti thanks to a grant from St. Luke in Silver Spring
- Ecumenical programming during Lent, including an ecumenical Ash Wednesday service and Stations of the Cross every year on Good Friday
- Worship with other Christian communities in the area
- Events for alumni and friends of the ministry, such as our annual Homecoming tailgate

We have a special focus on <u>sharing the good news</u> with students who have not heard it before (or, who have heard a distorted message). As such, we continue to reimagine what we do and how we do it in order to be completely welcoming to first time worshippers.

We are in the midst of a three year capital campaign to raise \$150,000 for LCM@UMD with the goal to keep campus ministry strong for the next fifty years.

Walking with students during these formative years in their lives and faith is an incredible opportunity. There are many ways to support this ministry with young adults. 2015 GLOBAL MISSION TEAM

The Global Mission Team focused upon the enabling of congregations to proclaim Jesus Christ throughout the world by way of Companion Synod relationships with Lutheran Churches in Namibia, El Salvador and Slovakia, advocacy for peace through the Middle East Working Group, support of the ELCA Malaria Campaign, the work of the Immigration Team, ELCA Global Church Sponsorships, and Gifts of Hope.

COMPANION SYNOD TASK FORCES:

A. Namibia - Kathryn Tobias & Mark Victorson, Chairs

A Companion Synods Consultation was held at ELCA headquarters in Chicago on 6 through 7 November 2014. Rev. Benyam Kassahun, Area Director, Southern Africa and Rev. Barbara Berry-Bailey in charge of programs for Eastern and Southern Africa presided. All four synods partnering with Namibian synods were represented. In addition to Kathy Tobias and Mark Victorson, the DC Metro Synod was also represented by Rev. Elijah Mwitanti, Pastor at Epiphany Lutheran Church in Woodbridge. His insights were especially helpful during the meeting.

We again addressed the possibility of supporting the visit of a Namibian missionary pastor to our synods this year. A committee was established to explore the options. Whether we will have the time and the funds to put together a mission visit this year remains to be seen.

There had been discussion during telephone conferences throughout the past year of partnering with non-synodical organizations in working with Namibia, and Mark suggested that Friends of Namibian Children (FNC) would make a good partner, since it is on the ground there and is a fine example of how we want to walk with our Namibian counterparts, rather than to seem to be telling them what we think is best for them. The representatives were generally supportive, although there was concern the FNC is not a Lutheran organization. Rev. Berry-Bailey is going to look into ELCA rulings on this subject.

Thanks to Pastor Bob Allard, Chair Mark Victorson received an \$1800 donation to Friends of Namibian Children (FNC) from the Woodbridge Rotary Club. Janet Wenk, CEO, FNC, reports that the "Grow the Gardens" program to establish a garden at each hostel has set up micro-drip irrigation gardens at ten of the hostels, and there are hopes to provide the gardens to the remaining nine hostels in the near future. These systems use very little water, and vegetables grow in black plastic bags to minimize the evaporation in the arid climate. These gardens will provide the children fresh vegetables and will enable them to sell produce for income for the hostels.

Some of FNC Board of Directors held a working meeting on 2 January 2015, and it was reported that 900 Bibles have been delivered to the International Book Project (IBP). The 96 Children's Story Bibles should be delivered after the new year. If IBP can match shipping funds, FNC will supply \$1,400 toward the shipping costs. Hostel Director Engelhardt Unaeb will be contacted to find out if he can present the Bibles at each youth hostel.

It was also reported that the tentative dates for the mission trips with Hope4Kids in 2015 are 13-26 February and 6-19 October. Hope4Kids provides teams to do maintenance and repair work at the hostels. Plumbing repair is one area in need of work. FNC is looking into non-profits, which provide toilets and septic systems. One such organization is World Toilet Organization (WTO). FNC is also researching on biolatrines, a new kind of toilet being developed jointly by Kohler and Cal Tech.

Pastor Allard and Mark Victorson are now members of the eastern branch of the FNC Board of Directors, as is Rachel Schmidt, who attended our last meeting and who served for FNC in the Hostel's Director's office for three years. Rachel chairs the eastern branch of the Board.

This year there will be celebrations of the first Christian missions in Tanzania, and in 2017 the Lutheran World Federation will meet in Namibia.

Companion Synod Sunday

A synod resource guide and Sunday School curriculum was created for Slovakia in honor of Companion Synod Sunday. In 2015, Slovakia was the featured companion synod honored on this Sunday. The curriculum included Sunday School lessons for each age group from Preschool through Adult. Most lessons were themed around the historic articular churches in Slovakia. These lessons were published on the Synod website. Among the features of the curriculum were kits that Sunday School youth could build replicating the historic articular churches.

Visit from Pastor Hroban, Martin, Slovakia

Pastor Hroban from the Martin Lutheran School and Church visited the Synod early this year to share the work of his ministry in Martin. He gave a sermon at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church and met with the Global Mission Committee members from Slovakia. He announced the building of a larger facility for the school in Martin, now named the Center for Christian Education, and was thankful for the generous donations from many of the congregations in the USA, including in the Washington DC Synod, that enabled him to proceed with this new initiative. The school provides children and youth from Martin and the surrounding areas the ability to receive a strong bilingual education based on Christian values. It is a school that is very popular in the region and this new building allows for more children on the waiting list to be able to attend.

Youth Representative

Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church Youth Group sponsored a Youth representative from Slovakia to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in Detroit this July. Filip Menky was the

International Representative chosen from Slovakia. He attended an initial orientation for international youth visitors in Chicago along with a youth representative from Saint Matthews. He then spent some time in Virginia with his host church youth group before leaving for Detroit. Filip met Global Mission Committee members at a dinner held at the Allard's house a few days before the ELCA Youth Gathering. He talked about growing up as a Pastor's son in Michalovce. His church was the first one for which local Gifts of Hope moneys were used to help build.

Preschool Idea Exchange

Three preschools from the Washington Metro D.C. Synod have been paired with three preschools in Slovakia with the purpose of communication exchange. They have been introduced to each other by email and it is hoped that students and teachers will reach out to each other, exchange ideas and information about their respective schools and grow a relationship. Two schools paired were Saint Matthews in Lake Ridge Virginia with the Lutheran Academy in Martin. I met with the Director and teachers at Lord of Life Preschool in Fairfax and Faith Preschool in Arlington, Virginia to introduce the initiative and talk about the church in Slovakia. I then forwarded their contact information together with a notification of their interest to the foreign liaison in the Bishop's office in Bratislava. They were each paired with at least one school. Lord of Life was introduced to the Evangelical Preschool in Presov. Faith Preschool was introduced to the Evangelical preschool in Kosice.

Meeting with European Representative

Bishop Graham and I met on Friday September 18 at the synod office with Johanna Olson, Manager for Relationships, Europe, the Middle East and North Africa, and Martina Helmer-Pham Xuan, the Regional Representative of the ELCA for Europe. Conversation revolved around the refugee crisis in Europe, most particularly in Germany and the work the Washington D.C. synod has done in conjunction with the Church in Slovakia. Bishop Graham asked for a project that could be worked on to monetarily support the efforts of the church in Europe to bring to the Synod Assembly for consideration. It was suggested that a contribution to the work of the Church of the Augsburg Confession in Slovenia might be appropriate. He will get back to me to tell me if this was approved.

Gifts of Hope

\$4,566.36 was sent to Bratislava on July 16, 2015 representing Gifts of Hope Donations to refurbish a very old church in Slovakia In Kamenany. The roof is damaged and the older church members who comprise most of the church congregation cannot afford to repair it. The Gifts of Hope request for next year will be the same as this request seemed to appeal to potential donors.

MIDDLE EAST WORKING GROUP - Nathan Rich, Chair

Participants in 2015 included Rev. Philip Anderson, Heidi Eickstadt, Anne Lipe, Jean Martensen, Rev. Ray Ranker, Nathan Rich, Kathy Tobias, and Paul Verduin.

During the calendar year 2016, the ELCA Metro DC Middle East Working Group sponsored the following activities:

 March 14 - We were honored to have Rev. Mark Brown, the Lutheran World Federation Regional Representative in Jerusalem, in town to give us a briefing on "Humanitarian Assistance and Prospects for Peace in the Holy Land." He spoke about Augusta Victoria Hospital and other LWF Humanitarian services, East Jerusalem, and the peace process. The event was at St. Luke - Silver Spring. June 19 - Our Synod Assembly passed a resolution calling for "Conditioning U.S. Aid to Israel on Cessation of Israeli Settlement Construction in Occupied Areas." December 19 - The 9th Annual Bethlehem Prayer Service took place in the nave at the Washington National Cathedral. Bishop Graham continued his participation in this annual event, which is a joint simulcast with Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Palestine.
The ELCA Peace Not Walls team provides many resources and opportunities for the 3 A's of the PNW campaign: Accompaniment, Awareness Raising, and Advocacy. Here are some highlights from 2016:
Many of our youth who attended the National Gathering in Detroit experienced the PNW exhibit, which was a huge success. It enabled conversations with individuals and groups as they experienced the 3 A's. Volunteers were a mix of active PNW members (including former and future YAGM, former Ecumenical Accompaniers, ALAMEH member and Palestinian ELCA pastor, LWF representative), young adults from SE Michigan synod, and some of the ELCJHL youth who were attending the youth gathering.
Here is a sampling of some of the Action Alerts issued by the Peace Not Walls team (http://elca.org/Our-Work/Publicly-Engaged-Church/Peace-Not-Walls):
 June 2015 - Help members of Congress plan August recess trips to Israel. August 2015 - Urge your Members of Congress to issue a letter of authorization for the immediate transfer of 2015 allocations to the U.S. Agency for International Development in order to meet an urgent humanitarian need of the Palestinian people by covering at least 50 percent of the Palestinian Authority debt to Augusta Victoria Hospital and the other East Jerusalem hospitals. August 2015 - Tell Congress to end the Gaza blockade and promote a lasting peace to prevent more bloodshed and to build peace for Israelis and Palestinians. September 2015 - Urge your elected officials to call upon the Israeli government to halt separation wall/barrier construction and home demolitions. November 2015 - Tell Congress: Reject unconditional military aid to Israel.
The ACT Palestine Forum, in which the ELCA participates, sponsors a global ecumenical prayer vigil on the 24th of every month, until the Israeli occupation is dismantled, violence in the Middle East ends, and all can celebrate a just and lasting negotiated resolution to the Palestinian-Israeli conflict (http://actpalestineforum.org). Some of the emphases in 2015 were: □ January - Promotion and protection of human rights and the importance of non-violent means of pursuing justice in accordance with international law. We encourage our governments not to punish the Palestinian move to join the International Criminal Court (ICC) by withholding financial support. □ February - Prayer Petitions for Assistance for Gaza and for Justice in Accordance with International Law □ November - During the Advent Season, we are filled with hope for the coming of Christ's kingdom in the Holy Land and the world. This month, the ACT Palestine Forum prayer

vigil also coincides with the United Nations International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People.

METRO DC SYNOD MALARIA CAMPAIGN - Dorothy Sorrell, Chair

The ELCA four year Malaria Campaign ended in December 2015, and we exceeded the \$15 million ELCA goal that was set. As of January 12, 2016, the total giving had reached \$15,255,474.98. Our Synod has contributed \$383,047.70, and about 80% of our congregations participated in that giving. Of the 65 synods in the ELCA, the Metro Washington, DC Synod ranked number six in total giving. In terms of giving per member, the Metro DC Synod ranked number two - \$12.50 per member.

The work of the Malaria Campaign will continue though the ELCA World Hunger program. This is a good fit as people who are malnourished are obviously more susceptible to illnesses of all kinds, and their recovery from these illnesses sometimes less certain.

During 2016, World Hunger will be the emphasis of "Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA". The emphasis will start with the beginning of Lent in February, and the theme is "40 Days of Giving". During Lent resources will be available to assist members to help spiritually, intellectually and financially in reaching an ELCA goal of \$2 million by Easter Sunday. Individuals and congregations are encouraged to register online to be part of the "40 Days of Giving", and their giving will enable crucial work to begin. Many other World Hunger resources that can be used throughout the year are available online at www.ELCA.org/resources

IMMIGRATION TEAM - Gerry Johnson, Chair

Synod Immigration Team Objectives: By working together as a team we may more effectively engage in education and awareness-building, form relationships with the immigrant communities, network with others to strengthen our efforts, and do public policy advocacy. We will:

- organize ourselves among clergy and lay people to engage around the issue in a variety of ways;
- 2. formalize an "ad-hoc" Immigration Table with the Metro DC Synod
- 3. take actions on a number of fronts:□ education and awareness-building
 - □ build alliances with other faith-based and community organizations
 - engage in public policy advocacy

Accomplishments;

- 1. Established a working relationship with LIRS and LSS.
- 2. Established a working relationship with CASA de Virginia and The Young Group
- 3. Visited St. Luke's, Augustana's, and St Marks Latino ministries to talk about needs and support.

- 4. Arranged for CASA (and Synod) people (12 people) to be trained to take CAM (Central American Minor's Act applications so that children still living in Honduras, Guatemala, and El Salvador join family members that are here.
- 5. Arranged a training (20 people) with The Young Group Accompaniment Program to have people visit children in detention centers in VA. Two people from Synod are in the program.
- 6. Investigating the possibility of providing court assistance by court watching for children that are facing deportation. (Guarding Angel Program).
- 7. Provided a Syrian Refugee Bible Study that was distributed to Synod contacts.
- 8. Working with Syrian Advocacy group in Northern Virginia to strengthen the understanding and welcome of Syrian Refugees.
- 9. We have had six meetings, two meetings in Virginia, DC, and Maryland each.

Goals for 2016: These are some suggested goals for next year.

- 1.) Assist the support and development of our three (or more) Latino Ministries
- 2.) Work with LIRS and LSS with their Immigration efforts especially in the education and assistance with Syrian refugees.
- 3.) Assist a congregation in Hosting three (One in Virginia, DC, and in Maryland) Lugar de Bienvenida (Place of Welcome) Program (LIRS).
- 4.) Be a voice for immigration through advocacy to our congregations and on Capitol Hill.
- 5.) Seek out and provide ways that we can enhance the life of immigrants in our area by providing unique services. For example: The Guarding Angel Program—insuring proper judicial treatment of detained youth; The Accompaniment Program—providing personal connections to detained youth; or the Support of the CAM program—providing opportunities for Central Americans families to be safely and legally re-united.

REPORT OF THE EUCMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS TABLE

YEAR 2015-2016 CHAIR: THE REV. THOMAS PRINZ

In the synodical constitution the chief ecumenical officer of the synod is the synodical bishop. The ecumenical unit serves to support the bishop in fulfilling this arena of responsibility of the office of the synodical bishop. The ecumenical unit is constituted to enlarge, facilitate and manage the ecumenical relationships of the synod with other judicatories and organizations and to assist the bishop in the bishop's function as chief ecumenical officer. The unit is also charged with oversight of certain grants by the synod to local and regional ecumenical organizations. To this end the unit engages with our full communion partners at the local level and conducts activities to inform and encourage ecumenical contact and partnerships at the congregational and synodical level. We are committed to keeping informed on ecumenical texts and agreements, and maintain conversation with interested parties on these texts and topics. We are a full and active partner in the Lutheran Ecumenical and Interreligious Representative Network (LEIRN); the Lutheran Episcopal Coordinating Committee and other formal committees related to full communion partners and on-going dialogues and conversations with ecumenical and interreligious partners.

As a lead up to the 2017 500th year commemoration of the Reformation there has been a flurry of activity. Much of this activity quite naturally involves the Roman Catholic Church both internationally and nationally. Last year an international document From Conflict to
Communion was published along with a Study Guide and an approved order for worship titled Common Prayer. Additional materials are being made available for congregational and synodical use. This year another significant document was released jointly by the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) and the ELCA titled, Declaration of the Way. This is a product of a joint task force and highlights both a summary of thirty-two (32) dialogue agreements over the last 50 years and points the way to further convergence. We hope to work to promote the use of this material in our congregations in the coming two years. Round XII of the Lutheran-Catholic dialogue is taking up the topic "Faithful Teaching".

A major resource booklet has been prepared for inter-congregational conversation between United Methodist and ELCA communities titled <u>Building a Relationship</u>. There is continued and extensive cooperation between the Episcopal Church (TEC) both in the US and in Canada. This is reflected in our local Lutheran-Episcopal Coordinating Committee (LECC). In May the Coordinating Committee visited a joint parish in the Baltimore area, and we have just concluded a major clergy/AIM event at Shrine Mont in VA participated in by the three VA

diocese of the Episcopal Church and our VA and Metro DC Lutheran Synods. Over ninety persons gathered for the 3 day event which focused on our worship practices. Most of our bishops, including Bishop Graham attended and lead worship, as well as national ecumenical staff. This is the second such gather; the last being nine years ago.

Continued conversations and coordination with the Moravian Church and the Mennonite Church is moving to an international dialogue on baptism and engaging issues of peacemaking. While the Formula of Agreement partners: Presbyterian Church, USA (PCUSA), Reformed Church in America (RCA) and the United Church of Christ (UCC) has no national coordinating committee talks have coalesced around possible joint commemorations of the Reformation anniversary. The tragic event at Mother Emanuel AME church in Charleston has sharpened a renewed activity on the part of the ELCA in matters of racism. Bishop Easton has been a major participant in the memorial service following the shootings and ELCA has had an important role in the Black Methodist Coalition, Racial Reconciliation Summit in Louisville and the Conference of National Black Churches. There is an expectation that many AME bishops will be personally present at the ELCA Assembly this summer.

Churches Uniting is Christ (CUIC) has languished for some years but a plenary held this spring has brought new energy to this long standing multi-lateral conversation. Christian Churches Together (CCT) has Lutheran participation in its leadership and the National Council of Churches (NCC) which has struggled and downsized in recent years continues its work in Faith and Order matters.

Interreligious relationships maintained through consultative panels with Jewish and Muslim groups continue to face hard and tense issues. In December of 2015 Bp Easton issued an Open Letter to the American Muslim Community. The ELCA has promoted the Shoulder to Shoulder Campaign with the Muslim community, and more broadly, encourages our congregations to use the resource, Engaging Others; Knowing Ourselves: A Lutheran Calling in a Multi-Religious World.

LWF and ELCA ecumenical involvements are almost overwhelming in number and seriousness. Here at the local level we try to help communicate this work done on our behalf and to work with willing partners to bring this witness into the lives of congregations and members of synod. As a local unit we maintain an on-going Lutheran-Roman Catholic conversation and a local regional Lutheran-Episcopal Coordinating Committee. Our unit has organized observance of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (WPCU); provided leadership within the Lutheran Ecumenical Representative Network (LEIRN); the National Workshop on Christian Unity (NWCU); the North American Academy of Ecumenists (NAAE) the Washington Theological Consortium (WTC) the annual conference of the Center for Catholic and Evangelical Theology (CCET).

As a synod we participate in the Virginia Council of Churches on the Executive Committee and the Faith and Order Unit and the recently revived Interfaith Conference of Greater Washington (IFC). One of our members was honored with a Faith in Action Award by the VCC.

Budget constraints continue to limited our operations but we have not diminished our commitment or focus. The unit meets about 5 times a year and through its members participates in over forty additional meetings and events. We hope to assist the synod in making our observance of the events of the Reformation anniversary an occasion of ecumenical significance which it has always been and remains so today.

Remembering that injuries of the mind, spirit, and relationships do not show as clearly as physical injuries, offer rituals of healing and reconciliation for active duty members and members of the Reserve and National Guard upon their return from deployment or special duty, and periodically thereafter;
- h. Conduct and/or participate in events in our congregations, conferences, and/or our synod that equip individuals and congregations to offer needed care and support for returning veterans. Such activities include the ELCA "Centurion Connection" and "Care for Returning Veterans" programs, support to wounded warriors, Partners in Care (a state National Guard initiative), and other efforts to receive those returning home with open hearts and arms;
- Realizing that not all honorably discharged veterans transition well, and some find themselves incarcerated, congregations which already have a prison ministry are encouraged to make a special effort to seek out incarcerated veterans to thank them for their service and to help them access their veterans' benefits so that they might have a more successful transition upon their release.

McIntosh 28 (1823), that Native inhabitants have no property or any other rights which 29 colonizing European nations and their sovereigns are bound to respect. This 30 principle promotes the myth that the Americas were a largely empty land that 31 European conquerors and migrants had a right to claim, occupy, and possess 32 simply by virtue of their Christianity and their European civilization. 33 WHEREAS, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC) and the ELCA's full 34 communion partners--the Episcopal Church, the United Church of Christ, the 35 United Methodist Church and the Moravian Church--have publicly repudiated the 36 "doctrine of discovery;" therefore, be it 37 RESOLVED, that the Metropolitan Washington, D.C. Synod Assembly offers herewith a 38 statement of repentance and reconciliation to Native nations in this country for 39 damage done in the name of Christianity and "civilization," and memorialize the

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40 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to repudiate the "doctrine of discovery," 41 repent of the damage done in the name of the European Christian-derived 42 "doctrine of discovery" and of complicity in the evils of colonialism in the 43 Americas, seeking reconciliation with Native nations in this country by: 44 directing the ELCA Office of the Presiding Bishop to plan an appropriate 45 ELCA national ceremony of repentance and reconciliation with tribal leaders, 46 and provide resources for similar synodical and congregational observances with local tribal leaders, at all such times and places as are appropriate; and 47 48 directing the ELCA Church Council, with the help of Native communities, to 49 commit the ELCA to the development of resources, in the next triennium, to 50 help its congregations and people understand and reduce the negative 51 impact of the "doctrine of discovery" and its consequences for Native people 52 in North America: and

> directing the ELCA Domestic Mission Unit to bring forward to the 2019 Churchwide Assembly a renewed strategy for ministry with Native people in the ELCA and accompaniment with North American Native communities in general, with a particular commitment to long-term, stable funding of ELCA American Indian and Alaskan Native ministries, increasing partnerships with congregations and synods in the ELCA, and promoting efforts with the Native communities within which our congregations and synods reside.
