⁴¹⁻⁴² That day about three thousand took him at his word, were baptized and were signed up. They committed themselves to the teaching of the apostles, the life together, the common meal, and the prayers.

⁴³⁻⁴⁵ Everyone around was in awe—all those wonders and signs done through the apostles! And all the believers lived in a wonderful harmony, holding everything in common. They sold whatever they owned and pooled their resources so that each person's need was met.

⁴⁶⁻⁴⁷ They followed a daily discipline of worship in the Temple followed by meals at home, every meal a celebration, exuberant and joyful, as they praised God. People in general liked what they saw. Every day their number grew as God added those who were saved.

While part of Stewardship is financial, it is also about prayer, learning, praising God, and offering gratitude to God and also to each other. To support the Synod in these practices, the Table helped to offer the virtual opportunity to explore stewardship in uncertain times with GSB Partner, Rev. Mike Ward, CFRE. One take away from this event is the power and importance of story. To build on this, one priority of this Table in the upcoming year will be to invite and share stories about how God is active in our Synod and Congregations.
