YAGM Program Description

The Young Adults in Global Mission program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) invites young adults, ages 21-29, into a transformative, year-long journey in global service.

Participants are placed in one of more than 10 countries and serve in the spirit of accompaniment — walking together with global companions in mutuality, solidarity and interdependence.

Volunteers explore and deepen their faith, worldview, and self-understanding as they serve and live in community with local hosts. Participants are shaped by the witness of our global neighbors as they provide critical support to ministries and projects in communities of need.

Service placements vary widely. Areas of service include, but are not limited to, health and development, congregational ministry, human rights, education, homelessness, women's issues and children and youth. Volunteers are placed according to their individual interests, skills or growth areas. All site placements provide opportunities for young adults to confront issues of wealth and poverty, racial privilege, economic disparity and globalization, all through the lens of faith.
